

# Learn various types of arguments

An argument is a reason given most of the time in support of action or given to establish a point of view. An argument is both a good one and also a lousy argument that depends on the reasoning. A good argument is the one in which good reasons are given to believe that the conclusion presented is valid. If the reasons given are not good, then this would be called a bad argument. When an argument is used concerning grammar in a sentence that completes the meaning of the verb is known as an argument sentence. If there are any disagreements which surely are there, you have to deal with them and try to convince them. You should always be clear and concise to write a good argument. In our everyday routine, we make different arguments to prove that we are right or to prove someone good or bad. But most of the time, we never look back at either the argument we have given, sound or a bad one. We often hear brilliant arguments presented to sell some product which we are not even in the mood to buy.

There are different types of arguments. We will explore this one by one and see the difference among them with some examples of an [essay writer](#). The first type of argument which we are going to study is the Deductive argument. This type of argument is based on a solid premise for the conclusion. In such an argument, we begin with some statements that are assumed to be true. If the entire hypothesis is true and the conditions are applied correctly, it will be evident that the results will also be true. It works on a top-down approach because it always starts with a general statement. This type of argument could be valid or invalid, and it could be sound or unsound. For example, a hypothesis states that all men are mortal and Ali is a man, so we can say Ali is mortal if the first two statements are true.

Another type of argument is called Inductive argument, in which we draw a general conclusion based on different observations. It is a bottom-up type of logic because it involves the generalization of an idea. For example, one can say all the cows I have seen are black and conclude by saying that all cows are black. The conclusion here is wrong because all cows are not black. This is what we call a weak argument, so we can make it stronger by concluding that most cows are black. We use inductive arguments in everyday life to understand the world around us. This argument method also supports the scientific method. As we see, scientists gather data through the different types of experiments, hypothesize on that basis, and then test them. Here the intermediate step, which is making the hypothesis, is an inductive method, and it is also the primary type of reasoning in academic life which makes it more critical. It could be a solid or weak argument, and also, if the argument is strong, it could be both cogent and coherent. The main arguments are two inductive and deductive. Another type of argument included the Toulmin argument created by a British philosopher. In this type, the argument is divided into six essential parts, including claim, grounds, warrant, qualifier, and refutation, and at the end, the backing of that argument. The first three parts are the most important, the claim of that specific opinion and facts and links that connect to the claim. The argument with the most substantial evidence can claim success, but for that, it has to present the relevant data and the facts. For example, you want to ban smoking on office premises, that is your main claim, and the ground for that is smoking is harmful to health.

The Rogerian argument is another type of argument that can help to figure out the best possible solution. This argument is a conflict resolution strategy seeking common ground and mutual understanding while avoiding adverse effects. In this type of argument, we identify a common goal and try to make ground. Most of us are unfamiliar with this kind of argument but use it over daily life. When we have a problem inside our business, we gather our employees and take opinions to find a standard solution.

We also have formal and informal arguments which differ from each other based on logic. Informal arguments are used in everyday life in an ordinary language, but formal arguments are studied in informal language. Formal arguments are examined in informal logic or symbolic logic and explained formally.
